A12: Eight years old.

A14: He worked as a shepherd.

A16: Twelve years old.

A66: The Battle of Badr.

Q67: When did the Battle of Badr take place?

A67: 17th of Ramadan, 2 AH.

Q68: What was the strength of the Muslim army compared to the Quraysh at Badr?

A68: Muslims had 313 men; Quraysh had around 1,000 men.

Q69: Which major enemy of Islam and chief of Quraysh was killed at the Battle of Badr?

A69: Abu Jahl (Amr bin Hisham).

Q70: What major battle took place in the year 3 AH?

A70: The Battle of Uhud.

Q71: Why did the Muslims lose their initial advantage during the Battle of Uhud?

A71: The archers left their designated positions on the hill against the Prophet's explicit orders.

Q72: Which beloved uncle of the Prophet (PBUH), known as the "Lion of Allah," was martyred at Uhud?

A72: Hazrat Hamzah bin Abdul-Muttalib (RA).

Q73: What is another name for the Battle of Khandaq (The Ditch)?

A73: The Battle of the Confederates (Ghazwah al-Ahzab).

Q74: Which Persian companion suggested digging a trench to defend Madinah during the Battle of Khandaq?

A74: Hazrat Salman al-Farsi (RA).

A79: Hazrat Ali bin Abi Talib (RA).

Q80: What was the name of the first major battle fought against the Byzantine (Roman) forces in 8 AH?

A80: The Battle of Mu'tah.

Q81: What triggered the Conquest of Makkah by the Muslims?

A81: The Quraysh and their allies broke the terms of the Treaty of Hudaibiyyah by attacking Banu Khuza'ah.

Q82: In which Islamic year did the Conquest of Makkah take place?

A82: 8 AH (Ramadan).

Q83: How did the Prophet (PBUH) treat the people of Makkah after entering the city victoriously?

A83: He granted a general amnesty, forgiving his former persecutors.

Q84: What did the Prophet (PBUH) do immediately upon entering the Kaaba after the conquest?

A84: He destroyed all 360 idols inside and around it.

Q85: What major battle against the tribes of Hawazin and Thaqif took place shortly after the Conquest of Makkah?

A85: The Battle of Hunayn.

A88: Hazrat Fatima (RA).

Q89: Which wife of the Prophet (PBUH) was the daughter of Hazrat Abu Bakr (RA)?

A89: Hazrat Aisha (RA).

Q90: Which wife of the Prophet (PBUH) was the daughter of Hazrat Umar (RA)?

A90: Hazrat Hafsa (RA).

Q91: What was the final military expedition led by the Prophet (PBUH) in 9 AH to counter a Roman threat?

A91: The Expedition of Tabuk.

Q92: What is the 9th year of Hijrah called due to the massive number of tribal delegations coming to accept Islam?

A92: The Year of Delegations (Sanat al-Wufud).

A106: Hazrat Ruqayyah (RA).

A107: Hazrat Umm Kulthum (RA).

A108: Al-Qasim, Abdullah (also known as At-Tayyib/At-Tahir), and Ibrahim.

Q109: Which wife of the Prophet (PBUH) was known as "Umm al-Masakin" (Mother of the Poor) due to her immense charity?

A109: Hazrat Zainab bint Khuzaymah (RA).

Q110: Which wife was the daughter of the chief of the Banu Mustaliq tribe and was freed and married after her tribe's defeat?

A110: Hazrat Juwayriyah bint al-Harith (RA).

Q111: Which wife was of Jewish lineage, descending from Prophet Harun (Aaron), and married the Prophet (PBUH) after the Battle of Khaybar?

A111: Hazrat Safiyyah bint Huyayy (RA).

Q112: Which wife was the daughter of Abu Sufyan (the leader of Makkah) and migrated to Abyssinia before marrying the Prophet (PBUH)?

A112: Hazrat Umm Habibah (Ramlah bint Abi Sufyan) (RA).

Q113: Who was the last wife married by the Prophet (PBUH)?

A113: Hazrat Maymunah bint al-Harith (RA).

Q114: Who were the two beloved grandsons of the Prophet (PBUH) whom he called the “leaders of the youth of Paradise”?

A114: Hazrat Al-Hasan and Hazrat Al-Husain (RA).

Q115: What was the name of the Prophet’s (PBUH) white mule, which was a gift from the Muqawqis of Egypt?

A115: Duldul.

Q116: What was the name of the Prophet’s (PBUH) favorite camel, which he rode during the Hijrah and the Conquest of Makkah?

A116: Al-Qaswa.

Q117: How did Hazrat Aisha (RA) describe the character of the Prophet (PBUH) when asked about it?

A117: She said, “His character was the Quran.”

Q118: Who was the dedicated personal servant of the Prophet (PBUH) who served him for 10 years in Madinah?

A118: Hazrat Anas bin Malik (RA).

Q119: What did Hazrat Anas bin Malik (RA) say about the Prophet’s gentle treatment during his 10 years of service?

A119: He said the Prophet (PBUH) never once scolded him, hit him, or asked him “Why did you do this?” or “Why didn’t you do that?”.

Q120: How did the Prophet (PBUH) dress?

A120: He dressed simply, typically wearing a cotton tunic (Qamis) or a wrapper (Izar) and cloak (Rida), prioritizing cleanliness over luxury.

Q121: What did the Prophet (PBUH) wear on his right hand to seal official letters sent to foreign rulers?

A121: A silver ring engraved with the words “Muhammad Rasul Allah” (Muhammad the Messenger of Allah).

Q122: What physical miracle regarding the Prophet’s body is recorded during his travels in the desert sun?

A122: A cloud would frequently hover above him to provide shade.

Q123: What was the color of the turban the Prophet (PBUH) wore when he victoriously entered Makkah?

A123: Black.

Q124: How did the Prophet (PBUH) speak to people?

A124: Clearly and deliberately, repeating key points three times if necessary so that listeners could easily memorize them.

Q125: What was the Prophet's (PBUH) stance on physical layout when sitting in a gathering with his companions?

A125: He sat anywhere an open space was available, avoiding designated thrones or elevated seating so that strangers could not immediately tell him apart from his companions.

Part 7: Deeper into the Makkan Trials and Early Revelations (Questions 126–150)

Q126: What did Abu Lahab say to the Prophet (PBUH) on Mount Safa when the public call to Islam was made?

A126: He shouted, “May you perish this day! Is it for this that you have gathered us?”

Q127: Which Surah of the Quran was revealed to condemn Abu Lahab and his wife for their hostility?

A127: Surah Al-Masad (also known as Surah Al-Lahab).

Q128: What did Abu Lahab's wife, Umm Jamil, do to harm the Prophet (PBUH)?

A128: She used to scatter thorny bushes and sharp wood along the pathways the Prophet (PBUH) walked.

Q129: What cruel act did Abu Jahl perform while the Prophet (PBUH) was prostrating (in Sujud) near the Kaaba?

A129: He ordered the intestines and filth of a slaughtered camel to be dumped onto the Prophet's back.

Q130: Who came to rescue the Prophet (PBUH) and clean the camel filth off his back near the Kaaba?

A130: His young daughter, Hazrat Fatima (RA).

Q131: Who was the brutal master of Hazrat Bilal (RA) who tortured him on the scorching desert sands of Makkah?

A131: Umayyah bin Khalaf.

Q132: What word did Hazrat Bilal (RA) repeatedly chant while being tortured under a heavy rock?

A132: “*Ahad, Ahad*” (The One, The One).

Q133: Who bought and legally freed Hazrat Bilal (RA) from his abusive master?

A133: Hazrat Abu Bakr As-Siddiq (RA).

Q134: Why did the Quraysh leaders offer the Prophet (PBUH) wealth, kingship, and medical help through Utbah bin Rabi'ah?

A134: To convince him to stop preaching Islam and condemning their ancestral idol worship.

Q135: What was the Prophet's (PBUH) famous response to his uncle Abu Talib when pressured by Quraysh to stop his mission?

A135: "O my uncle! By Allah, if they put the sun in my right hand and the moon in my left to abandon this cause, I will not do so until Allah makes it prevail or I perish in the attempt."

Q136: Who was the famous companion known as "The Flying Ja'far" (Ja'far al-Tayyar)?

A136: Hazrat Ja'far bin Abi Talib (RA), so named because the Prophet said Allah replaced his lost arms with wings in Paradise.

Q137: Which Surah did Hazrat Ja'far (RA) recite to King Negus of Abyssinia to demonstrate Islam's high regard for Jesus and Mary?

A137: Surah Maryam.

Q138: What physical reaction did King Negus have after hearing the Quranic verses about Jesus?

A138: He wept until his beard was soaked, declaring that these words and what Jesus brought came from the same source of light.

Q139: What strategy did the Quraysh use to stop people from listening to the Quran when the Prophet (PBUH) recited it publicly?

A139: They told people to make noise, clap, and shout down the recitation so the message could not be understood.

Q140: What did the Quraysh write down on a parchment scroll and hang inside the Kaaba to formalize their hostility?

A140: The decree for the total social and economic boycott of the Banu Hashim and Banu Muttalib clans.

Q141: How did the economic boycott of the valley end after three years?

A141: Termites ate the entire parchment inside the Kaaba except for the words "In Your Name, O Allah" (*Bismika Allahumma*), and a group of fair-minded Makkans demanded the unjust treaty be torn up.

Q142: When the Prophet (PBUH) was bleeding and rejected in Ta'if, what did the Angel of the Mountains offer him?

A142: The angel offered to crush the city of Ta'if between the two steep mountains surrounding it (Al-Akhshabayn).

Q143: What was the Prophet's (PBUH) merciful response to the Angel of the Mountains?

A143: He refused revenge, saying, "No, I hope that Allah will bring from their descendants people who will worship Allah alone without associating partners with Him."

Q144: What was the name of the Christian slave boy in Ta'if who brought grapes to the Prophet (PBUH) and subsequently accepted Islam?

A144: Addas.

Q145: What did the Prophet (PBUH) ride during his miraculous Night Journey (Al-Isra wal-Mi'raj)?

A145: Al-Buraq, a white, winged creature that traveled as fast as the eye could see.

Q146: Who did the Prophet (PBUH) lead in prayer at Al-Aqsa Mosque during the Night Journey?

A146: All the previous Prophets of Allah.

Q147: Which major prophets did the Prophet (PBUH) meet in the first three heavens during the Mi'raj?

A147: Adam (1st heaven), Yahya and Isa (2nd heaven), and Yusuf (3rd heaven).

Q148: Which prophet did he meet in the seventh heaven, resting against Al-Bayt al-Ma'mur (The Frequent House)?

A148: Prophet Ibrahim (Abraham).

Q149: What is the name of the ultimate boundary Lote Tree in the highest heaven beyond which no creation can pass?

A149: Sidrat al-Muntaha.

Q150: How many daily prayers were originally commanded before being reduced to five through the intercession of Prophet Musa (Moses)?

A150: Fifty daily prayers.

Part 8: The Migration and Early Years in Madinah (Questions 151–175)

Q151: Where did the Quraysh leaders gather to plot the assassination of the Prophet (PBUH) right before his migration?

A151: Dar al-Nadwah (The Assembly House).

A152: To safely return the financial deposits and valuables that the Makkans had left with the Prophet for safekeeping.

A153: Verses from Surah Yasin (*“And We have put a barrier before them and a barrier behind them...”*).

Q154: Who brought food and water secretly to the Cave of Thawr where the Prophet (PBUH) and Abu Bakr were hiding?

A154: Hazrat Asma bint Abi Bakr (RA), the daughter of Abu Bakr.

Q155: What title did the Prophet (PBUH) give Hazrat Asma (RA) due to her ripping her waistband in two to tie up their food supply container?

A155: Dhat-un-Nitaqayn (The One with Two Waistbands).

Q156: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say to comfort Abu Bakr (RA) when the search party reached the mouth of the Cave of Thawr?

A156: “Do not grieve; indeed, Allah is with us” (Surah At-Tawbah, 9:40).

Q157: What bounty did the Quraysh place on the capture of the Prophet (PBUH) and Abu Bakr, dead or alive?

A157: One hundred camels for each of them.

Q158: What happened to Suraqah bin Malik’s horse when he neared the Prophet (PBUH) to capture him?

A158: The horse’s legs repeatedly sank deep into the solid desert sand, causing Suraqah to realize the Prophet was protected by Divine power.

Q159: What prediction did the Prophet (PBUH) make to Suraqah bin Malik during that encounter?

A159: He predicted that Suraqah would one day wear the golden bracelets of Chosroes (the Emperor of Persia).

Q160: Whose tent did the travelers pass during the Hijrah, where the Prophet (PBUH) miraculously milked a weak, barren goat?

A160: The tent of Umm Ma’bad al-Khuza’iyah.

Q161: For how many days did the Prophet (PBUH) stay at Quba before entering the heart of Madinah?

A161: Four days.

Q162: How did the Prophet (PBUH) democratically decide where to build his mosque and home in Madinah?

A162: He let his camel, Al-Qaswa, walk freely, stating she was guided by Allah. Wherever she sat, that would be the spot.

Q163: Who owned the land where Al-Qaswa knelt, which was subsequently bought to build Masjid an-Nabawi?

A163: Two orphan brothers named Sahl and Suhail.

Q164: Who was the first Muslim born among the Muhajirun in Madinah, bringing joy to the community after rumors that Jews had hexed them?

A164: Hazrat Abdullah bin al-Zubayr (RA).

Q165: What was the Suffah in Masjid an-Nabawi?

A165: A shaded raised platform at the back of the mosque that served as a residential school for poor, unmarried, or homeless companions (Ahl as-Suffah).

Q166: Who was the most famous companion among the Ahl as-Suffah, known for narrating the most Hadiths?

A166: Hazrat Abu Hurairah (RA).

Q167: How did the companions decide on using the human voice (Adhan) instead of bells, horns, or fires to call people to prayer?

A167: The companion Abdullah bin Zaid (RA) saw the exact words of the Adhan in a dream, which was confirmed by Umar (RA) and ratified by the Prophet.

Q168: Why was the direction of the Qiblah changed from Jerusalem to Makkah?

A168: The Prophet (PBUH) longed to face the Kaaba built by Ibrahim, and Allah granted his wish through revelation (Surah Al-Baqarah, 2:144).

Q169: Which mosque in Madinah is named after the event where the congregation changed their prayer direction mid-prayer?

A169: Masjid al-Qiblatayn (The Mosque of the Two Qiblahs).

Q170: Which Jewish tribe of Madinah was the first to violate the Charter of Madinah after the Battle of Badr?

A170: Banu Qaynuqa.

Q171: What penalty was imposed on the Banu Qaynuqa tribe for breaking the treaty and harassing a Muslim woman?

A171: They were exiled from Madinah, leaving behind their weapons and property.

Q172: In which year did the Prophet (PBUH) institute Zakat (obligatory alms) as a formal pillar of the Islamic economy?

A172: 2 AH.

Q173: What was the main trade route that the Makkans relied on, which the Muslims began intercepting to counter Makkan economic power?

A173: The trade route passing northward along the Red Sea coast to Syria.

Q174: Who was the leader of the commercial caravan coming back from Syria whose protection led directly to the Battle of Badr?

A174: Abu Sufyan bin Harb.

Q175: How many horsemen did the Muslims have in their small army during the Battle of Badr?

A175: Only two horsemen.

Part 9: Strategic Battles and Defensive Crusades (Questions 176–200)

Q176: What did the Prophet (PBUH) do the night before the Battle of Badr?

A176: He spent the entire night standing in prayer and weeping, supplicating to Allah for victory until his cloak fell off his shoulders.

Q177: What was the famous prayer the Prophet (PBUH) made before Badr regarding his small community?

A177: “O Allah, if this small band of Muslims is destroyed today, You will not be worshipped on this earth again.”

A178: Hazrat Hamzah, Hazrat Ali, and Hazrat Ubaydah bin al-Harith (RA).

A179: Allah sent an army of thousands of angels to assist and strengthen the believers.

Q180: How did the Prophet (PBUH) deal with the prisoners of war captured at the Battle of Badr?

A180: He treated them humanely, allowing literate prisoners to gain freedom by teaching ten Muslim children how to read and write.

Q181: Which daughter of the Prophet (PBUH) passed away in Madinah during the Battle of Badr?

A181: Hazrat Ruqayyah (RA), the wife of Hazrat Usman (RA).

Q182: What was the primary motivation of the Quraysh in launching the Battle of Uhud?

A182: To avenge their humiliating defeat and the loss of their chieftains at Badr.

Q183: How many archers did the Prophet (PBUH) station on Mount Aynayn (now known as Archers' Hill) during the Battle of Uhud?

A183: Fifty archers.

Q184: Who was the leader appointed over the archers on the hill at Uhud?

A184: Hazrat Abdullah bin Jubair (RA).

Q185: Which brilliant military commander (who had not yet accepted Islam) exploited the archers' error to attack Muslims from behind at Uhud?

A185: Khalid bin al-Walid.

Q186: What physical injuries did the Prophet (PBUH) sustain during the fierce fighting at Uhud?

A186: His helmet rings were smashed into his cheekbone, his lip was cut, and one of his lower teeth was chipped.

Q187: Which female companion shielded the Prophet (PBUH) with her sword and body when the Muslim lines broke at Uhud?

A187: Hazrat Umm Umarah (Nusaybah bint Ka'b) (RA).

Q188: What false rumor spread through the battlefield during the chaos of Uhud that caused panic?

A188: The rumor that Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) had been killed.

Q189: Who mutilated the body of Hazrat Hamzah (RA) after he was martyred at Uhud?

A189: Hind bint Utbah (the wife of Abu Sufyan), who hired the slave Wahshi to kill him.

Q190: What did the Prophet (PBUH) do immediately the day after Uhud to show strength and deter the Makkans from returning?

A190: He led the injured Muslim army out to a location called Hamra al-Asad to chase the Quraysh forces.

Q191: What was the tragedy of Bi'r Ma'ona that took place in 4 AH?

A191: A treacherous ambush where seventy highly educated Quran reciters (Qurra) were massacred by pagan tribes.

Q192: Which Jewish tribe of Madinah plotted to assassinate the Prophet (PBUH) by dropping a boulder on his head from a rooftop?

A192: Banu Nadir.

Q193: What was the outcome of the confrontation with the Banu Nadir tribe in 4 AH?

A193: They were besieged, surrendered, and were exiled from Madinah, moving mostly to Khaybar.

Q194: How long was the trench dug by the Muslims to defend Madinah during the Battle of Khandaq?

A194: Approximately 5.5 kilometers long, spanning the open northern entry point of the city.

Q195: How many soldiers did the combined pagan and tribal alliance (The Confederates) bring to besiege Madinah at Khandaq?

A195: Ten thousand soldiers.

Q196: Which Jewish tribe inside Madinah committed high treason by breaking their treaty to assist the besieging army during Khandaq?

A196: Banu Qurayzah.

Q197: How was the siege of Khandaq broken after nearly a month of standoff?

A197: Allah sent a freezing, violent windstorm that destroyed the enemy's tents, upturned their cooking pots, and drove them away in fear.

Q198: Who was the companion appointed to judge the fate of the treacherous Banu Qurayzah tribe according to their own scripture?

A198: Hazrat Sa'd bin Mu'adh (RA).

Q199: What happened to Hazrat Sa'd bin Mu'adh (RA) shortly after passing his judgment on Banu Qurayzah?

A199: His old arrow wound from Khandaq reopened, and he passed away; the Prophet said the Throne of Allah shook at his death.

Q200: What did the Prophet (PBUH) declare regarding military dynamics after the victory at Khandaq?

A200: He said, "From this day on, we will go to attack them (the Quraysh) and they will not come to attack us."

A206: He objected to the phrase “Muhammad, Messenger of Allah,” arguing that if they believed he was Allah’s messenger, they wouldn’t have blocked him. It was changed to “Muhammad, son of Abdullah.”

Q207: Which companion refused to erase the words “Messenger of Allah” from the treaty scroll out of sheer reverence?

A207: Hazrat Ali bin Abi Talib (RA). The Prophet (PBUH) then erased the words with his own hands.

Q208: For how many years did the Treaty of Hdaybiyyah establish peace and suspend war between Makkah and Madinah?

A208: Ten years.

Q209: What highly unfair clause did the treaty contain regarding individuals defection or migration?

A209: If a Makkan accepted Islam and fled to Madinah, the Muslims had to return him; if a Muslim left Madinah for Makkah, the Makkans did not have to return him.

Q210: Who was the Muslim refugee who arrived at Hdaybiyyah in chains, begging for help, just as the treaty was signed?

A210: Hazrat Abu Jandal (RA), who happened to be the son of the negotiator Suhail bin Amr.

A213: His wife, Hazrat Umm Salamah (RA), who suggested he go out and sacrifice his camel and shave his head publicly without saying a word.

A214: They immediately rushed to follow his example, sacrificing their animals and shaving one another's heads.

Q215: What did the Prophet (PBUH) use the newfound peace of Hdaybiyyah to achieve?

A215: He launched an international diplomatic campaign, sending letters to world emperors inviting them to Islam.

Q216: Which Roman Emperor received the Prophet's (PBUH) letter through the envoy Dihyah al-Kalbi (RA)?

A216: Emperor Heraclius.

Q217: Whom did Heraclius summon to court to cross-examine and verify the character of the Prophet (PBUH)?

A217: Abu Sufyan, who happened to be in Syria on a trade mission at the time.

Q218: What was Heraclius's conclusion after questioning Abu Sufyan about the Prophet's lineage, truthfulness, and message?

A218: He admitted that if everything Abu Sufyan said was true, Muhammad was indeed a true Prophet, and his dominion would soon reach the ground beneath his feet.

A219: Chosroes (Khosrow II), the Emperor of Persia.

Q221: Who was the ruler of Egypt and Alexandria to whom the Prophet (PBUH) sent a letter of invitation?

A221: Al-Muqawqis.

Q222: How did Al-Muqawqis respond to the Prophet's (PBUH) letter?

A222: He received the envoy politely and sent respectful gifts to the Prophet (PBUH), including garments and a mule.

Q223: What was the name of the ruler of Yamamah who rejected the invitation unless he was given a share in governance?

A223: Hawdhah bin Ali.

Q224: Which companion was sent as an envoy with a letter to the King of Abyssinia (Negus)?

A224: Hazrat Amr bin Umayyah al-Damri (RA).

Q225: What was the name of the Umrah performed by the Muslims in 7 AH to make up for the missed pilgrimage of Hudaybiyyah?

A225: Umrah al-Qada (The Fulfilled Umrah).

Part 11: The Fall of Khaybar and New Allies (Questions 226–250)

Q226: Why did the Prophet (PBUH) march against the fortresses of Khaybar in 7 AH?

A226: Because Khaybar had become a dangerous hotbed of military plots, funding the pagan tribes to launch surprise attacks on Madinah.

Q227: How many fortresses made up the formidable Jewish stronghold of Khaybar?

A227: Eight major fortresses.

Q230: Who was the legendary, giant Jewish warrior of Khaybar who challenged the Muslims to single combat and was defeated by Hazrat Ali (RA)?

A230: Marhab.

Q231: What physical feat did Hazrat Ali (RA) perform when his shield was struck out of his hand during the storming of the Khaybar fort?

A231: He ripped a heavy iron gateway off its hinges and used it as a shield for the remainder of the battle.

Q232: What assassination attempt did the Prophet (PBUH) survive immediately after the victory at Khaybar?

A232: A Jewish woman named Zainab bint al-Harith served him a roasted sheep laced with a deadly poison.

Q233: How did the Prophet (PBUH) know the food was poisoned before swallowing a lethal amount?

A233: The piece of meat spoke to him by the permission of Allah, saying, “O Messenger of Allah, I am poisoned.”

Q234: Which companion swallowed a piece of the poisoned meat during that meal and passed away shortly after?

A234: Hazrat Bishr bin al-Bara (RA).

Q235: What terms did the Prophet (PBUH) grant to the people of Khaybar after they surrendered?

A235: He allowed them to stay on their lands and farm them on the condition that half of their agricultural harvest be paid to the Islamic state.

Q236: Which two highly influential military leaders traveled from Makkah to Madinah to accept Islam in 8 AH?

A236: Hazrat Khalid bin al-Walid (RA) and Hazrat Amr bin al-Aas (RA).

Q237: What title did the Prophet (PBUH) give Hazrat Khalid bin al-Walid (RA) due to his tactical brilliance?

A237: Saifullah (The Sword of Allah).

Q238: What was the immediate cause of the Battle of Mu'tah in 8 AH?

A238: The Ghassanid governor, a vassal of the Roman Empire, broke diplomatic immunity by executing the Prophet's envoy, Harith bin Umair (RA).

Q239: Whom did the Prophet (PBUH) appoint as the first commander for the expedition to Mu'tah?

A239: Hazrat Zayd bin Harithah (RA).

A240: If Zayd is killed, Ja'far bin Abi Talib takes command; if Ja'far is killed, Abdullah bin Rawahah takes command.

A241: The Muslim army had 3,000 men; they were met by a massive Byzantine coalition numbering close to 200,000 soldiers.

A242: Nine swords.

A249: The house of his daughter, Hazrat Umm Habibah (RA), who was a wife of the Prophet (PBUH).

Q250: What reason did Hazrat Umm Habibah (RA) give her father for pulling the mattress away from him?

A250: She said, "This is the clean mattress of the Messenger of Allah, and you are an unclean polytheist."

Part 12: The Liberation of Makkah (Questions 251–275)

Q251: What strategy did the Prophet (PBUH) use to guarantee that Makkah would be liberated without bloodshed?

A251: He kept the military preparations completely secret so the Muslims could catch the Makkans off guard and force a peaceful surrender.

A254: Because Hatib confessed his mistake honestly, and the Prophet noted he was a veteran of the Battle of Badr, whom Allah had forgiven.

Q255: On what date did the Muslim army march out from Madinah to liberate Makkah?

A255: 10th of Ramadan, 8 AH.

Q256: How many Muslim soldiers made up the historic army that marched to conquer Makkah?

A256: Ten thousand soldiers.

Q257: What tactical order did the Prophet (PBUH) give his army when they camped at Marr al-Zahran near Makkah at night?

A257: He ordered every single soldier to light their own separate campfire to make the army appear impossibly massive to Makkan scouts.

Q258: Who was captured by Muslim scouts while spying on the camp at Marr al-Zahran?

A258: Abu Sufyan, the chief of Makkah.

Q259: Who brought Abu Sufyan safely to the Prophet's (PBUH) tent, leading to Abu Sufyan accepting Islam that night?

A259: Hazrat Al-Abbas bin Abdul-Muttalib (RA), the Prophet's uncle.

Q260: What special psychological privilege did the Prophet (PBUH) grant Abu Sufyan to preserve his honor as a leader?

A260: He declared: "Whoever enters the house of Abu Sufyan shall be safe."

Q261: What other two locations did the Prophet (PBUH) declare as zones of absolute safety for the citizens of Makkah?

A261: "Whoever locks their own front door shall be safe, and whoever enters the courtyard of the Holy Kaaba shall be safe."

Q262: How did the Prophet (PBUH) physically enter Makkah on his camel to demonstrate his humility?

A262: He rode with his head bowed so low in gratitude to Allah that his beard almost touched the saddle of his camel.

Q263: Into how many separate military columns did the Prophet (PBUH) split his army to enter Makkah from all directions?

A263: Four separate columns.

Q264: Which commander's column faced brief armed resistance from a small group of stubborn Makkans at the southern gate?

A264: Hazrat Khalid bin al-Walid (RA).

Q265: What famous Quranic verse did the Prophet (PBUH) recite as he toppled the pagan idols around the Kaaba with his staff?

A265: "Truth has come, and falsehood has vanished. Indeed, falsehood is bound to vanish" (Surah Al-Isra, 17:81).

Q266: Who did the Prophet (PBUH) order to climb to the roof of the Holy Kaaba to call the Adhan on the day Makkah was conquered?

A266: Hazrat Bilal bin Rabah (RA).

Q267: What question did the Prophet (PBUH) ask the gathered citizens of Makkah as they waited to hear their execution or slavery sentences?

A267: “O Quraysh! What do you think I am going to do with you today?”

Q268: What did the Makkans reply to the Prophet’s question regarding their fate?

A268: They said, “We expect good from you. You are a noble brother and the son of a noble brother.”

Q269: What legendary words of forgiveness did the Prophet (PBUH) utter to his lifelong persecutors?

A269: “Go, for you are all free (Tulaqa).” He used the exact words of Prophet Yusuf (Joseph) to his brothers.

Q270: Who was Ikrimah, the son of Abu Jahl, and what happened to him after the Conquest of Makkah?

A270: He initially fled Makkah by sea in terror, but his wife secured an amnesty for him from the Prophet; he returned, accepted Islam, and became a dedicated soldier.

Q271: Why did the Prophet (PBUH) refuse to move back to live in his hometown of Makkah after its successful conquest?

A271: Out of loyalty to the Ansar, he promised them that he would live and die with them in Madinah.

Q272: Which massive pagan tribal alliance began mobilizing an army of 20,000 men immediately after Makkah fell, leading to the Battle of Hunayn?

A272: The Hawazin and Thaqif tribes.

Q273: How large was the Muslim army that marched to meet the enemy forces at the valley of Hunayn?

A273: Twelve thousand men (the 10,000 from Madinah plus 2,000 newly converted Makkans).

Q274: What spiritual mistake did some Muslims make regarding their army size right before the Battle of Hunayn?

A274: They felt overconfident, boasting, “We will not be defeated today due to small numbers.”

Q275: What happened to the Muslim army when they entered the narrow pass of the valley of Hunayn at dawn?

A275: They were caught in a catastrophic ambush by enemy archers hiding on the slopes, causing the Muslim lines to break and retreat in panic.

Part 13: Consolidation and Consolidation of Power (Questions 276–300)

Q276: Who remained steadfastly by the side of the Prophet (PBUH) at Hunayn when thousands of soldiers fled?

A276: A tiny group of about a dozen close companions and family members, including Hazrat Abu Bakr, Umar, Abbas, and Ali (RA).

A277: “I am the Prophet, this is no lie! I am the son of Abdul-Muttalib!”

A278: His uncle, Hazrat Al-Abbas (RA), who possessed an exceptionally loud, commanding voice.

Q279: What miracle did the Prophet (PBUH) perform at Hunayn that turned the tide of the battle?

A279: He took a handful of desert dust and threw it toward the enemy lines, causing it to magically enter the eyes of every single opposing soldier.

Q280: Which fortified city did the fleeing remnants of the Hawazin and Thaqif tribes lock themselves into after Hunayn?

A280: The mountain city of Ta’if.

Q281: What advanced siege weapon did the Muslims use for the first time in Islamic history during the Siege of Ta’if?

A281: The catapult (Manjanik).

Q282: Why did the Prophet (PBUH) lift the Siege of Ta’if after several weeks without a total military surrender?

A282: He realized the city posed no immediate military threat anymore, and prayed, “O Allah, guide the people of Thaqif and bring them to us.”

Q283: Where did the Prophet (PBUH) store and distribute the massive spoils of war captured from the victory over Hawazin?

A283: At a valley location called Al-Ji’ranah.

Q284: Why did the Prophet (PBUH) give massive shares of the war booty to former enemy chieftains like Abu Sufyan and Safwan bin Umayyah?

A284: To soften their hearts toward Islam and solidify their fragile, newfound faith (called *Mu’allafati Qulubuhum*).

Q285: Why did the native helpers (Ansar) of Madinah feel hurt during the distribution of the spoils at Al-Ji'ranah?

A285: Because they received none of the worldly wealth, while the newly converted Makkans received vast herds of camels and sheep.

A287: 9 AH.

A503: Hazrat Bilal bin Rabah (RA).

A507: Hazrat Al-Shifa bint Abdullah (RA).

Q508: What was the Prophet's legal policy regarding the absolute equality of punishments for crimes like theft?

A508: He declared that justice must be blind, famously stating: "By Allah, even if Fatima, the daughter of Muhammad, were to commit theft, I would have her hand cut off."

Q509: Which noble woman from the Makhzum clan committed theft, leading the Quraysh to try to use Usama bin Zayd to beg the Prophet for a softer punishment?

A509: Fatima bint al-Aswad.

Q510: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say to Usama bin Zayd when Usama tried to intercede for the aristocratic woman thief?

A510: He became deeply upset and asked, "Are you trying to intercede regarding one of the legal punishments prescribed by Allah?"

Q511: What historical reason did the Prophet (PBUH) give for the destruction of past nations during that same sermon on justice?

A511: He said, "The nations before you were destroyed because when a high-ranking noble stole, they let him go, but when a poor, weak person stole, they enforced the legal punishment upon him."

Q512: Who was the first official governor (Amir) of Makkah appointed by the Prophet (PBUH) when he returned to Madinah in 8 AH?

A512: Hazrat Attab bin Asid (RA), who was only around 21 years old at the time.

Q513: How much salary did the Prophet (PBUH) allocate for the young governor Attab bin Asid (RA) to prevent state corruption?

A513: One dirham per day, which Attab declared was more than enough to make him independent of bribes.

Q514: What was the Prophet's legal policy regarding a judge who passes a wrong judgment after putting in his best honest effort?

A514: He said that if a judge strives honestly to find the truth (Ijtihad) and judges correctly, he gets a double reward; if he strives honestly but makes a mistake, he still gets a single reward from Allah.

Q515: Who was the companion appointed as the state envoy to the ruler of Oman, Jaifar bin Al-Julanda, successfully bringing the region into the fold of Islam?

A515: Hazrat Amr bin al-Aas (RA).

Q516: What tax system was introduced by the Prophet (PBUH) for non-Muslim citizens of the state in exchange for exemption from military service and full state protection?

A516: Jizyah.

Q517: Were women, children, the elderly, or the poor among non-Muslims required to pay the Jizyah tax?

A517: No, it was strictly levied only on free, sane, adult men who were physically capable of military combat.

Q518: What was the name of the special tax levied on land and agricultural produce captured from enemy territory, first implemented at Khaybar?

A518: Kharaj.

Q519: Who was the companion sent by the Prophet (PBUH) every harvest season to Khaybar to evaluate the crop yields with absolute fairness?

A519: Hazrat Abdullah bin Rawahah (RA).

Q520: What did the Jewish farmers of Khaybar say when Abdullah bin Rawahah (RA) divided the harvest into two equal piles and let them choose whichever pile they preferred?

A520: They said, “By this absolute justice, the heavens and the earth stand.”

Q521: Who was the companion appointed by the Prophet (PBUH) as the official caretaker of the state’s camel and livestock pastures outside Madinah?

A521: Hazrat Bilal bin Al-Harith (RA).

Q522: What was the Prophet’s policy regarding the ownership of dead, uncultivated wasteland?

A522: He encouraged economic development by stating, “Whoever revives dead land, it belongs to them.”

Q523: Whom did the Prophet (PBUH) appoint to oversee the distribution of financial shares to the families of soldiers martyred at Badr?

A523: Hazrat Abu Bakr As-Siddiq (RA).

Q524: What official title or description did the Prophet (PBUH) give to his governance system in Madinah regarding documentation?

A524: He mandated written contracts for all international treaties, internal tribal pacts, and financial loans, creating a culture of written law.

Q525: What was the name of the companion who served as the executive manager of the Prophet’s household logistics and incoming foreign state gifts?

A525: Hazrat Mu’ayyib bin Abi Fatimah (RA).

Part 23: Minor Expeditions and Strategic Outposts (Questions 526–550)

Q526: What is the historical name of the military expedition in 2 AH that took place just before Badr, where the Prophet (PBUH) went looking for a Quraysh caravan

but found none?

A526: The Expedition of Al-Ushayrah.

Q527: What prophetic prediction did the Prophet (PBUH) make to Hazrat Ali (RA) while they were resting on the ground during the Al-Ushayrah expedition?

A527: He called Ali “Abu Turab” (Father of Dust) because his clothes were covered in dirt, and predicted that the most wretched man of the nation would one day strike Ali on the head and soak his beard in blood.

Q528: What was the name of the strategic raid in 2 AH led by Abdullah bin Jahsh (RA) that resulted in the first capturing of enemy spoils and prisoners before Badr?

A528: The Nakhla Raid.

Q529: Why did the Nakhla Raid cause severe political controversy in Madinah initially?

A529: Because the Muslim unit accidentally attacked the caravan during the sacred month of Rajab, when fighting was strictly forbidden by old Arab custom.

Q530: How did Allah resolve the controversy of the Nakhla Raid in the Quran?

A530: He revealed verses in Surah Al-Baqarah (2:217) stating that fighting in the sacred month is a grave offense, but preventing people from the path of Allah, disbelief, and driving people out of the Grand Mosque is a far greater offense in the sight of Allah.

Q531: What was the name of the minor expedition in 3 AH where the Prophet (PBUH) led 450 men to disperse a gathering of the Banu Tha’labah tribe who were planning a raid on Madinah?

A531: The Expedition of Dhu Amarr.

Q532: What miracle involving a pagan warrior named Gwarath bin al-Harith occurred during the Dhu Amarr expedition?

A532: Gwarath found the Prophet sleeping alone under a tree, drew his sword, and asked, “Who will save you from me now?” The Prophet calmly replied, “Allah.” Gwarath was gripped with fear, dropped his sword, and the Prophet picked it up and asked the same question. Gwarath accepted Islam.

Q533: What was the name of the expedition in 4 AH launched against the Banu Muharib tribe, where the Muslims performed the “Prayer of Fear” (Salat al-Khawf) for the first time?

A533: The Expedition of Dhat al-Riqā (The Expedition of Rags).

Q534: Why was that expedition named “Dhat al-Riqā” (The Expedition of Rags)?

A534: Because the rough desert terrain tore the companions’ shoes to pieces, forcing them to wrap old rags and bandages around their bleeding feet.

Q535: What was the name of the critical expedition in 5 AH to the Syrian border to crush a gathering of lawless highway tribes who were targeting merchant caravans?
A535: The Expedition of Dumat al-Jandal.

Q536: What was the name of the expedition in 6 AH led by Hazrat Ukasha bin Al-Mihsan (RA) to secure the water outposts north of Madinah?
A536: The Expedition of Al-Ghamr.

Q537: Which companion led the strategic rescue mission known as the Expedition of Dhu Qarad in 6 AH to reclaim the Prophet's stolen dairy camels?
A537: Hazrat Salamah bin al-Akwah (RA), who chased down the entire raiding party on foot using his unmatched archery.

Q538: What praise did the Prophet (PBUH) give Salamah bin al-Akwah (RA) after the Dhu Qarad rescue?
A538: He said, "The best of our foot-soldiers today is Salamah bin al-Akwah."

Q539: What was the name of the expedition in 6 AH where the Prophet (PBUH) sent Hazrat Ali (RA) to destroy the pagan gathering of Banu Sa'd at Fadak?
A539: The Expedition of Fadak.

Q540: Which companion was dispatched in 6 AH with a unit to the territory of Banu Juhaynah, leading to a famous legal incident regarding a battlefield conversion?
A540: Hazrat Usama bin Zayd (RA).

Q541: What mistake did Usama bin Zayd (RA) make during the Banu Juhaynah expedition that deeply angered the Prophet (PBUH)?
A541: He chased down an enemy soldier who quickly shouted "La ilaha illa Allah" (There is no god but Allah) right before Usama struck him, but Usama killed him anyway, assuming he said it only to save his life.

Q542: What did the Prophet (PBUH) repeatedly ask Usama bin Zayd (RA) when he heard about the killing of the man who declared faith?
A542: He asked with intense grief, "Did you tear open his heart to see whether he said it sincerely or not?"

Q543: What was the name of the expedition sent to the Red Sea coast in 8 AH under the command of Hazrat Amr bin al-Aas (RA), where he requested reinforcements due to large enemy numbers?
A543: The Expedition of Dhat as-Salasil.

Q544: Whom did the Prophet (PBUH) send as the leader of the reinforcement unit to assist Amr bin al-Aas at Dhat as-Salasil?

A544: Hazrat Abu Ubaidah bin al-Jarrah (RA), along with elite companions like Abu Bakr and Umar.

Q545: What tactical decision did Amr bin al-Aas (RA) make at night during the Dhat as-Salasil expedition that upset the soldiers but was later backed by the Prophet?

A545: He forbade his men from lighting fires despite the freezing cold, to prevent the enemy from realizing how small their army was.

Q546: What was the name of the expedition in 9 AH led by Hazrat Khalid bin al-Walid (RA) to capture the Christian prince of Ukaydir at his fortress?

A546: The Expedition of Dumah al-Jandal (Part 2).

Q547: How did Khalid bin al-Walid (RA) capture Prince Ukaydir?

A547: He caught him outside his castle walls late at night while the prince was out hunting wild cows.

Q548: What terms did the Prophet (PBUH) give to Prince Ukaydir when he was brought to Madinah?

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A563: He noted that if the Prophet performed Wudu, they would almost fight to collect the water drops, and if he spoke, they dropped their voices in absolute awe.

Q564: What happened to Urwah bin Mas'ud al-Thaqifi when he later accepted Islam and returned to Ta'if to preach?

A564: His own people turned on him and martyred him with arrows while he was calling the Adhan from his rooftop.

Q565: Who was the companion Wahshi bin Harb, and what did the Prophet request from him after his conversion?

A565: He was the slave who martyred the Prophet's uncle Hamzah at Uhud; he later accepted Islam, and the Prophet forgave him but politely requested him to avoid sitting directly in his line of sight to prevent the painful memory of Hamzah from overwhelming him.

Q566: How did Wahshi bin Harb (RA) redeem himself later during the Caliphate wars?

A566: He used the exact same javelin that killed Hamzah to execute the false prophet Musaylimah the Liar at the Battle of Yamamah.

Q567: Who was the Christian scholar and ruler of the border province of Ailah, John bin Ru'bah, who met the Prophet during the Tabuk expedition?

A567: He approached the Prophet peacefully, dressed in a garment of silk, and agreed to maintain peace and pay the Jizyah tax in exchange for state protection.

Q568: Who was the companion Amr bin al-Aas (RA) talking about when he said, "No one was more hated by me than him, and I wished I could destroy him"?

A568: He was talking about his own feelings toward the Prophet (PBUH) prior to his conversion.

Q569: What did Amr bin al-Aas (RA) say about his feelings toward the Prophet after he accepted Islam?

A569: He said, “Then no one became more beloved to me than him, and I could never look him fully in the eye out of sheer reverence for him.”

Q570: What condition did Amr bin al-Aas (RA) try to place when he stretched out his hand to pledge allegiance to the Prophet?

A570: He pulled his hand back at the last second, stating he wanted a guarantee that all his past sins would be entirely forgiven.

Q571: What did the Prophet (PBUH) tell Amr bin al-Aas (RA) that comforted him completely regarding his past?

A571: “Do you not know, O Amr, that Islam wipes out all past sins, that the Hijrah wipes out all past sins, and that Hajj wipes out all past sins?”

Q572: Who was Mus’ab bin Umair’s brother who fought on the pagan side at Badr and was captured by the Muslims?

A572: Abu Aziz bin Umair.

Q573: What did Mus’ab bin Umair (RA) tell the Muslim soldier who was tying up his captive brother Abu Aziz?

A573: He said, “Tie his bonds tightly, for his mother is a very wealthy woman and she will pay a massive ransom for him.” Abu Aziz was shocked that his brother valued faith over blood.

Q574: Who was the wealthy chief of the Banu Kilab tribe, Al-Duhaak bin Sufyan, who accepted Islam and was appointed as a military recruiter for his entire region?

A574: Hazrat Al-Duhaak bin Sufyan (RA).

Q575: Who was the elite noble woman Hind bint Utbah, and what did she do when she accepted Islam at the Conquest of Makkah?

A575: She wore a thick veil to hide her identity out of shame for her actions at Uhud, but the Prophet recognized her voice, welcomed her gently, and accepted her pledge without a single word of reproach.

Part 25: Societal Shifts and Institutional Transformations (Questions 576–600)

Q576: What was the Prophet’s revolutionary policy regarding the inheritance rights of women?

A576: He abolished the old Arab custom where women were treated as property to be

inherited, and established their divine legal right to inherit property from parents, husbands, and siblings.

Q577: What was the Prophet's explicit stance on the forced marriage of girls?

A577: He made it legally invalid, stating that a virgin girl cannot be married without her explicit permission, and a previously married woman cannot be wed without her direct command.

Q578: What did the Prophet (PBUH) do when a young girl came to him complaining that her father had forced her to marry her cousin against her will?

A578: He gave the girl full legal authority to annul the marriage instantly if she wished.

Q579: What did that same girl declare after the Prophet gave her the power to cancel her forced marriage?

A579: She said, "I actually accept my father's choice, but I wanted women to know that fathers have no legal right to force them into marriage."

Q580: How did the Prophet (PBUH) change the old Arab perspective on having daughters?

A580: He condemned the practice of burying newborn girls alive (Wa'd) and promised Paradise to anyone who raises daughters with love and kindness.

Q581: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state regarding a parent who raises two daughters properly?

A581: "Whoever raises two daughters kindly until they reach maturity, I and he will be like this in Paradise," holding his fingers close together.

Q582: What institutional framework did the Prophet (PBUH) set up to care for widows and the elderly who had no tribal support?

A582: He institutionalized state welfare, stating that running errands and providing financial care for a widow or poor person is equal to fighting in the path of Allah or praying all night without sleep.

Q583: How did the Prophet (PBUH) reform the prison system and the treatment of prisoners of war?

A583: He commanded his companions: "Treat the prisoners with kindness," forcing the Muslims to give their fresh bread to captives while they ate nothing but dry dates.

Q584: What did the Prophet (PBUH) do regarding the age-old practice of slavery?

A584: He could not abolish it overnight due to global economic realities, but he systematically choked it by making the freeing of slaves the primary spiritual expiation (Kaffarah) for major sins.

Q585: What was the Prophet's command regarding the social status and lifestyle of slaves/servants?

A585: He ordered that they must be fed from the exact same food their masters eat, dressed in the same quality of clothing, and never given work beyond their physical capacity.

Q586: What was the legal penalty introduced by the Prophet (PBUH) for a master who physically abuses or strikes his servant/slave?

A586: He stated that the only way to expiate the sin of striking a slave on the face is to set them free instantly.

Q587: What structural change did the Prophet (PBUH) make to the banking and credit system of Arabia?

A587: He established interest-free community loans (Qard al-Hasan) and introduced bankruptcy protection laws to protect debtors from being enslaved for their debts.

Q588: How did the Prophet (PBUH) reform the concept of property ownership?

A588: He ruled that natural resources like public water wells, green pastures, and fire resources cannot be privatized or hoarded by wealthy tycoons, but must remain public property.

Q589: What was the Prophet's guidance on consumer protection and truth in advertising?

A589: He banned artificial price inflation schemes (Najash), where fake buyers bid up prices in a market to trick real customers.

Q590: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state regarding the safety of roads and public transit across Arabia under Islamic rule?

A590: He predicted that Islam would bring so much stability that a woman would eventually be able to travel alone from San'a (Yemen) to Al-Hirah (Iraq) fearing nothing but Allah and the wolf for her sheep.

Q591: What was the name of the special health and medical station set up adjacent to Masjid an-Nabawi to treat wounded soldiers and the poor?

A591: The medical tent of Hazrat Rufaida al-Aslamia (RA), who is recognized as the first female nurse in Islamic history.

Q592: How did the Prophet (PBUH) reform the old system of tribal alliances (Asabiyyah)?

A592: He replaced alliances based on bloodlines with a brotherhood based on shared moral values and faith, making a non-Arab slave equal to a Quraysh noble.

Q593: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say regarding the status of a person's mother?

A593: When a man asked who deserved his best companionship, the Prophet replied three consecutive times, "Your mother," before mentioning "Your father" on the fourth turn.

Q594: What famous phrase did the Prophet (PBUH) utter regarding the spiritual status of mothers?

A594: “Paradise lies under the feet of mothers.”

Q595: How did the Prophet (PBUH) balance spirituality with worldliness regarding monasticism (Rahbaniyyah)?

A595: He strictly banned permanent celibacy and monastic isolation, stating: “There is no monasticism in Islam; my tradition is to marry, work, pray, and fast.”

Q596: What did the Prophet (PBUH) do when three companions vowed to fast every single day, pray all night without sleep, and never marry to show their devotion?

A596: He corrected them publicly, saying that he was the most God-fearing among them, yet he slept, broke his fasts, and married, concluding: “Whoever turns away from my tradition is not from me.”

Q597: What was the Prophet’s revolutionary approach to education and literacy?

A597: He made the pursuit of knowledge an absolute religious obligation, stating: “Seeking knowledge is mandatory upon every single Muslim (male and female).”

Q598: How did the Prophet (PBUH) use war dynamics to boost literacy in Madinah?

A598: By allowing literate prisoners of war to earn their absolute freedom simply by teaching literacy to ten native children of Madinah.

Q599: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say about the ink of a scholar versus the blood of a martyr?

A599: He highly elevated intellectualism, stating that the ink of the scholar is holier and more precious in the sight of Allah than the blood of the martyr.

Q600: What was the ultimate vision of peace the Prophet (PBUH) laid down for humanity as recorded in his final directives?

A600: “Spread peace (Salam), feed people food, maintain family ties, and pray at night

Part 26: Public Health, Crisis Management, and Science (Questions 601–625)

Q601: What was the Prophet’s (PBUH) revolutionary rule regarding epidemic or plague management?

A601: He established the concept of quarantine, saying: “If you hear of a plague in a land, do not enter it; and if it breaks out in a land where you are, do not leave it.”

Q602: What public health instruction did the Prophet (PBUH) give regarding sneezing or coughing?

A602: He would cover his face with his hand or a cloth and suppress his voice, establishing basic respiratory hygiene.

Q603: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say about seeking medical treatment for illnesses?

A603: He encouraged it, stating: “There is no disease that Allah has created except that He also has created its treatment.”

Q604: What was the Prophet’s directive regarding dental hygiene?

A604: He said: “Were it not that I did not want to overburden my nation, I would have ordered them to use the Miswak (tooth-stick) before every prayer.”

Q605: What environmental warning did the Prophet (PBUH) give regarding stagnant water?

A605: He strictly forbade urinating or leaving waste in stagnant water, preventing the breeding of water-borne pathogens and parasites.

Q606: What basic rule of fire safety did the Prophet (PBUH) issue for families at night?

A606: He said: “Do not leave fires burning in your houses when you go to bed.”

Q607: How did the Prophet (PBUH) advise people to manage their food intake to prevent overeating and obesity?

A607: He said a human should fill a third of their stomach with food, a third with liquid, and leave a third for easy breathing.

Q608: What rule did the Prophet (PBUH) set regarding drinking water or liquids?

A608: He forbade breathing or blowing into a drinking vessel and advised drinking in three slow, distinct breaths while sitting down.

Q609: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say about natural herbal medicine, specifically mentioning black seed (Habbat al-Sawda)?

A609: He said: “Use the black seed, for indeed it is a cure for all diseases except death.”

Q610: What did the Prophet (PBUH) instruct regarding the washing of hands before and after meals?

A610: He stated that washing the hands before food removes poverty, and washing them after food removes dirt and brings blessings.

Q611: How did the Prophet (PBUH) manage food scarcity during a severe winter drought in Madinah?

A611: He centralized resources, instructing families to gather their remaining food into a single pile to be distributed equally by weight.

Q612: What was the Prophet’s command regarding the psychological treatment of a sick person during medical visits?

A612: He said: “When you visit a sick person, comfort them regarding their lifespan; it does not change destiny, but it cheers them up.”

Q613: What did the Prophet (PBUH) rule regarding physical fitness and sports?

A613: He encouraged archery, horse riding, swimming, and running, stating: “A strong believer is better and more beloved to Allah than a weak believer.”

Q614: Whom did the Prophet (PBUH) defeat in an official wrestling match in Makkah, leading the undefeated champion to accept Islam?

A614: Rukanah bin Abdi Yazid.

Q615: What structural advice did the Prophet (PBUH) give to people building houses near flash flood pathways?

A615: He ordered them to keep the roads wide and build away from the natural water channels to prevent loss of life during sudden rains.

Q616: How did the Prophet (PBUH) handle mental health and grief within the community?

A616: He allowed the natural crying of tears but strictly banned pagan rituals like tearing clothes, slapping cheeks, or screaming out loud.

Q617: What was the Prophet's view on superstitions like solar eclipses being tied to the death of famous leaders?

A617: When the sun eclipsed on the day his son Ibrahim died, he corrected the public saying: "The sun and moon do not eclipse due to the death or birth of anyone; they are simply signs from Allah."

Q618: What prayer ritual did the Prophet (PBUH) introduce to be performed during a solar or lunar eclipse?

A618: Salat al-Kusuf (The Eclipse Prayer), a prolonged congregational prayer focused on charity and seeking forgiveness.

Q619: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say about astrology or believing that stars control human destiny?

A619: He completely rejected it, stating that whoever attributes rain or fortune directly to the alignment of stars has committed an act of disbelief.

Q620: What did the Prophet (PBUH) instruct regarding animal epidemics like mange in camels?

A620: He instructed that an owner of sick camels must keep them completely separated from healthy herds to stop the spread of infection.

Q621: What was the Prophet's legal rule regarding a person who practices medicine without proper training?

A621: He declared: "Whoever practices medicine without being known for medical knowledge is legally liable for any harm they cause."

Q622: What specific honey-based cure did the Prophet (PBUH) advise for a man suffering from severe stomach illness?

A622: He repeatedly ordered the man's brother to give him honey until the stomach infection was completely cleared.

Q623: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say about mental wellness and the value of a positive attitude?

A623: He said: "I am amazed by the believer; all of his affairs are good for him... if good happens he is grateful and it is good, and if hardship happens he is patient and it is good."

Q624: What was the Prophet's instruction regarding physical posture when sleeping?

A624: He advised sleeping on the right side of the body with the right hand placed under the cheek.

Q625: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state regarding the continuous pollution of public trees and shade?

A625: He warned: "Beware of the three acts that bring curses: relieving oneself in water sources, on public paths, and in places of public shade."

Part 27: Splendor of the Ahl al-Bayt / Prophetic Household (Questions 626–650)

Q626: Who are collectively referred to as "Ahl al-Bayt" in Islamic tradition?

A626: The immediate household family members of the Prophet (PBUH), including his wives, children, and close relatives like Ali, Hasan, Husain, and Abbas (RA).

Q627: What unique title did the Prophet (PBUH) give to his daughter Hazrat Fatima (RA)?

A627: Sayyidatu Nisa-il-Alamin (The Leader of the Women of the Worlds).

Q628: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say regarding his deep emotional connection to Fatima (RA)?

A628: He said: "Fatima is a piece of me; whoever angers her angers me, and whoever hurts her hurts me."

Q629: How did the Prophet (PBUH) react whenever Hazrat Fatima (RA) walked into his room?

A629: He would stand up out of respect, kiss her on the forehead, take her by the hand, and give her his own seat.

Q630: What was the name of the special spiritual event where the Prophet (PBUH) gathered Ali, Fatima, Hasan, and Husain under a large cloak and prayed for their absolute purification?

A630: Hadith al-Kisa (The Incident of the Cloak).

Q631: What phrase did the Prophet (PBUH) use to describe his grandsons Al-Hasan and Al-Husain (RA)?

A631: He called them "my two sweet basil flowers (Rayhanatayn) in this world."

Q632: What prophetic prediction did the Prophet (PBUH) make regarding his grandson Al-Hasan (RA) while holding him on the pulpit?

A632: He said: “This son of mine is a leader, and Allah will make peace through him between two massive factions of Muslims.”

Q633: What did the Prophet (PBUH) do when a poor companion asked him for financial aid, but he had nothing left to give?

A633: He would direct them to the house of Fatima or another family member, stating that guiding someone to good brings the same reward as doing it.

Q634: What wedding gift did the Prophet (PBUH) give to Hazrat Ali (RA) and Hazrat Fatima (RA) for their household?

A634: A rough mattress filled with palm fibers, a leather water skin, two clay pots, and a hand-mill for grinding grain.

Q635: What spiritual litany did the Prophet (PBUH) teach Fatima (RA) when she asked for a servant to help with household chores?

A635: SubhanAllah (33 times), Alhamdulillah (33 times), and Allahu Akbar (34 times) before sleeping, stating it was better for her than a servant.

Q636: Who was the Prophet’s uncle who protected him during childhood and died without accepting Islam despite the Prophet’s intense weeping?

A636: Abu Talib.

Q637: Who was the Prophet’s uncle who embraced Islam, became a brilliant leader, and whose descendants established a major historical caliphate?

A637: Hazrat Al-Abbas bin Abdul-Muttalib (RA).

Q638: What special prayer did the Prophet (PBUH) make for his young cousin, Abdullah bin Abbas (RA)?

A638: “O Allah, grant him deep understanding of the religion and teach him the interpretation of the Quran.”

A639: He stated: “None loves Ali except a believer, and none hates Ali except a hypocrite.”

Q640: What was the statement made by the Prophet (PBUH) at Ghadir Khumm regarding Hazrat Ali (RA)?

A640: He declared: “Whomever I am his master (Mawla), Ali is his master.”

Q641: Who was the stepson of the Prophet (PBUH), raised in his house, whom he taught table manners by saying: “O boy! Say Bismillah, eat with your right hand, and eat from what is in front of you”?

A641: Hazrat Omar bin Abi Salamah (RA).

Q642: Which wife of the Prophet (PBUH) was his closest counselor during difficult situations and was the first to receive tidings of a palace in Paradise made of hollow pearls?

A642: Hazrat Khadija bint Khuwaylid (RA).

Q643: How did the Prophet (PBUH) honor the memory of Khadija (RA) long after her death?

A643: Whenever he slaughtered a sheep, he would cut it into pieces and send them directly to the close friends of Khadija as a gift.

Q644: Who was the Prophet's paternal aunt, Arwa bint Abdul-Muttalib, and what was her status?

A644: She accepted Islam in Makkah, migrated to Madinah, and used her poetry to support her nephew's mission.

Q645: Which cousin of the Prophet (PBUH) was known for his extreme generosity, being nicknamed "The Father of the Poor" (Abu al-Masakin) because he fed the hungry daily?

A645: Hazrat Ja'far bin Abi Talib (RA).

A654: The camel began to weep out loud and ran to lean its head against the Prophet's shoulder; the Prophet wiped its tears and rebuked the owner for starving and overworking the animal.

Q655: What miracle regarding vision did the Prophet (PBUH) possess during congregational prayers?

A655: He stated: "Straighten your rows, for by Allah, I can see you behind my back just as I see you in front of me."

Q656: What did a large rock in Makkah do whenever the young Muhammad (PBUH) walked past it before his prophethood?

A656: The Prophet stated: "I know a stone in Makkah which used to greet me with Salam before I was commissioned as a Prophet; I recognize it even now."

Q657: What miracle involving physical strength occurred when the companions failed to break a massive boulder inside the trench at Khandaq?

A657: The Prophet (PBUH) took the pickaxe and struck the rock; it crumbled into sand on his blow, emitting bright flashes of light that revealed visions of the future conquests of Persia and Rome.

Q658: What miracle involving food multiplication occurred at the home of Hazrat Abu Hurairah (RA) with a small bowl of milk?

A658: The Prophet blessed the bowl and had Abu Hurairah serve all the poor students of the Suffah (around 70 men) one by one; all drank until they were completely full, and the milk remained unexhausted.

Q659: What happened to a dead, dry branch that the Prophet (PBUH) handed to Ukasha bin Mihsan (RA) during the Battle of Badr when Ukasha's sword snapped?

A659: As soon as Ukasha waved the branch, it miraculously transformed into a long, gleaming, unbreakable steel sword that he used for years.

Q660: What miracle occurred regarding the broken leg of the companion Abdullah bin Atik (RA) after he executed an enemy leader?

A660: The Prophet (PBUH) wiped his blessed hand over the broken leg; Abdullah stated it healed instantly as if it had never been fractured.

A661: While the companions were gathering weapons, the Prophet (PBUH) was already riding back alone on an unsaddled horse belonging to Abu Talhah, declaring the city was safe and that the slow horse had run like a vast ocean.

Q662: What miracle involved a small handful of dates brought by the young daughter of Bashir bin Sa'd during Khandaq?

A662: The Prophet spread the small handful of dates onto a cloth; they multiplied continuously until they filled the cloaks of all the workers at the trench.

Q663: What happened to a poisonous snake that entered the cave of Thawr while the Prophet was sleeping on Abu Bakr's lap?

A663: Abu Bakr blocked the snake's hole with his foot and was bitten; his tears woke the Prophet, who applied his saliva to the wound, neutralizing the poison instantly.

Q967: How did he define the true meaning of a "Mu'min" (a true believer)?

A967: "A believer is the one whom people trust completely with their lives and their property."

Q968: What was the Prophet's ultimate advice on managing personal relationships and reducing social friction?

A968: "Do not harbor mutual hatred, do not envy one another, do not turn your backs on one another, but be servants of Allah in complete brotherhood."

Q969: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state about the spiritual reward of removing a worldly difficulty for an individual?

A969: "Whoever relieves a believer of a distress from the distresses of this world, Allah will relieve him of a distress from the distresses of the Day of Resurrection."

Q970: What was the Prophet's perspective on continuous human self-improvement and education?

A970: He encouraged lifelong learning, advising his community to actively seek wisdom and treat it as the lost property of the believer, to be claimed wherever it is found.

Q971: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state regarding the values of humility and arrogance?

A971: He warned: "No one who possesses even an atom's weight of arrogance in their heart will enter Paradise," defining arrogance as rejecting the truth and looking down on people.

Q972: What was his landmark message regarding the visual equality of humans in the sight of God?

A972: "Verily, Allah does not look at your physical appearances or your wealth, but He looks directly at your hearts and your actions."

Q973: What did the Prophet (PBUH) teach regarding environmental ethics and planting trees?

A973: "If the Final Hour strikes while one of you holds a plant sapling in his hand, if he can plant it before standing up, let him plant it."

Q974: What is the spiritual reward for a Muslim who plants a tree or sows a field, according to the Prophet?

A974: He stated that whenever a human, bird, or animal eats from that plant, it is recorded as a continuous act of charity (*Sadaqah Jariyah*) for the planter.

Q975: How did the Prophet (PBUH) instruct his followers to balance justice with mercy when executing legal punishments?

A975: He advised state judges: "Ward off the legal punishments as much as you can by finding doubts; for it is better for a judge to err in forgiveness than to err in punishment."

Q976: What was the physical description of the Prophet's standard signature mark on official global letters?

A976: A circular stamp reading "Muhammad" on the bottom line, "Rasul" on the middle line, and "Allah" on the top line, structured to place God's name highest.

Q977: How did the Prophet (PBUH) summarize the core purpose of his entire mission regarding human ethics?

A977: "I have only been sent to perfect the highest standards of moral character."

Q978: What occurred immediately after the Prophet (PBUH) completed his burial ceremony in Madinah?

A978: The companions felt a profound sense of emptiness, and Hazrat Fatima (RA) tearfully asked Anas bin Malik: "O Anas! How could your hearts find the strength to pour earth over the Messenger of Allah?"

Q979: What historical calendar system was established by the companions to mark the era of Islam based on the Seerah?

A979: The Hijri calendar system, initiated by Hazrat Umar (RA) using the historic year of the migration (*Hijrah*) to Madinah as Year 1 AH.

Q980: What is the exact geographic location where millions of travelers visit the Prophet (PBUH) to send him greetings of peace every year?

A980: The Sacred Chamber (*Al-Rawdah al-Sharifah*) located inside Masjid an-Nabawi in Madinah under the iconic Green Dome.

Q981: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state regarding the spiritual status of the open space between his house and his pulpit inside the mosque?

A981: He declared: “The space between my house and my pulpit is one of the gardens (*Rawdah*) of Paradise.”

Q982: How did the Prophet (PBUH) ensure that his lineage and family records were preserved?

A982: Through his daughter Hazrat Fatima (RA) and her sons Hasan and Husain, whose descendants (*Sadat / Ashraf*) safely maintained the familial records across generations.

Q983: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state about the spiritual consequence of sending greetings of peace (*Salawat*) upon him?

A983: He said: “Whoever sends a single blessing upon me, Allah will send ten blessings upon him, erase ten of his sins, and elevate him by ten spiritual degrees.”

Q984: How are the verbal greetings of peace delivered to the Prophet (PBUH) in his grave according to his Hadith?

A984: He informed his community that Allah has appointed an elite unit of angels who travel across the earth to collect the greetings of his nation and deliver them directly to his soul.

Q985: What was the Prophet’s description of his role as an intercessor (*Shafa’ah*) on the Day of Judgment?

A985: He stated that while all past prophets will say “Myself, myself,” he will bow prostrate under the Throne of Allah and cry out: “My nation, my nation (*Ummati, ummati*),” until Allah grants him the right of intercession.

Q986: What did the Prophet (PBUH) leave behind as a permanent textual roadmap to define the global rules of war and peace?

A986: The comprehensive set of rules regarding non-combatant safety, treaty fulfillment, and diplomatic safety built into his *Sunnah*.

Q987: How did the Prophet (PBUH) handle wealth accumulation among his top administrative generals?

A987: He monitored their assets closely, auditing their wealth before and after their governance terms to prevent state exploitation.

Q988: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state regarding the historical continuum of his message?

A988: He explained that his message was not a new religion, but the final, perfected revival of the original monotheistic faith taught by Adam, Noah, Abraham, Moses, and Jesus.

Q989: What unique description does the Holy Quran give to the character of Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) in Surah Al-Qalam?

A989: “And indeed, you are of a magnificent, sublime moral character” (Surah Al-Qalam, 68:4).

Q990: What description does the Quran give to his universal mission toward all creation in Surah Al-Anbiya?

A990: “And We have not sent you, [O Muhammad], except as a mercy to all of the worlds” (Surah Al-Anbiya, 21:107).

Q991: What was the name of the special historical sermon where the Prophet summarized the structural completeness of the religion?

A991: The Khutbah of the Farewell Pilgrimage (*Khutbat al-Wada*).

Q992: What did the Prophet (PBUH) say regarding the ultimate equality of all human biological origins?

A992: “O people! Verily your Lord is One and your father is one. All of you belong to Adam, and Adam was created from dust.”

Q993: What was the total number of years the Prophet spent actively delivering the divine message to humanity?

A993: Twenty-three years of intense, unwavering struggle and leadership.

Q994: What happened to the political landscape of the Arabian Peninsula by the exact time of the Prophet’s passing?

A994: It was entirely unified under a single administrative system of law, peace, and monotheism for the first time in history.

Q995: What was the name of the special book of spiritual prayers and guidance derived entirely from his daily practices?

A995: The vast corpus of *Adhkar* and prophetic supplications recorded systematically by the companions.

Q996: What did the Prophet (PBUH) state regarding the absolute truthfulness of his words during moments of lightheartedness or serious decree?

A996: He pointed to his lips and declared: “Write down what I say; for by Him in Whose Hand is my soul, nothing leaves this mouth except the absolute truth.”

Q997: What is the ultimate linguistic meaning of the phrase “Peace and Blessings of Allah Be Upon Him” (*Sallallahu Alayhi Wa Sallam*)?

A997: It is a continuous invocation asking Allah to elevate the Prophet’s rank, protect his message, and grant him ultimate peace in the highest heavens.

Q998: How did the companions describe the physical radiance and comforting presence of the Prophet (PBUH)?

A998: The companion Jabir bin Samurah (RA) stated: “I looked at the full moon on a clear night, and then I looked at the face of the Messenger of Allah; to me, he was far more beautiful and radiant than the moon.”

Q999: What was the final, overriding parting advice the Prophet (PBUH) gave to humanity to ensure universal success?

A999: “Hold fast to the rope of Allah altogether, remain united upon the truth, fulfill the rights of your fellow human beings, and worship your Lord until certainty comes to you.”

Q1000: What is the ultimate spiritual and historical conclusion of the Seerah of Prophet Muhammad (PBUH)?

A1000: His life serves as a complete, practical, and timeless manifestation of the Holy Quran—providing a comprehensive guide for human character, governance, justice, and absolute mercy for all generations to come.

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
