The Life of Prophet Muhammad ﷺ

Chapter 1 — Arabia Before Islam

Before the birth of Prophet Muhammad ﷺ, Arabia was a land steeped in **ignorance (Jahiliyyah)**. The Arabian Peninsula was home to hundreds of tribes, each with its own customs, rivalries, and loyalties. The people worshipped idols — over **360 idols** were placed inside and around the Ka'bah, which had originally been built by Prophet Ibrahim (AS) for the worship of Allah alone.

Society was marked by:

- **Tribal warfare** — constant blood feuds between clans
- **Oppression of women** — daughters were sometimes buried alive at birth
- **Slavery** — human beings were bought and sold openly
- **Alcoholism and gambling** — widespread vices without moral restraint
- **Inequality and injustice** — the rich exploited the poor mercilessly

Yet even in this darkness, Arabia had noble qualities — hospitality, bravery, eloquence in poetry, and a strong sense of honor. Allah chose this land and this time to send His final messenger as a mercy to all of humanity.

Chapter 2 — Birth and Early Childhood (~570 CE)

Prophet Muhammad ﷺ was born in **Makkah** around **570 CE**, in the **Year of the Elephant** — the same year Abraha, the ruler of Yemen, led an army with war elephants to destroy the Ka'bah but was miraculously repelled by birds sent by Allah.

He was born into the **Banu Hashim** clan of the **Quraysh** tribe — one of the most respected families in Makkah. His father, **Abdullah ibn Abdul Muttalib**, had passed away before his birth. His mother was the noble **Aminah bint Wahb**.

Key events of early life:

- While with Halimah, the famous **incident of the opening of the chest** occurred — angels came and purified his heart
- His mother **Aminah** passed away when he was just **6 years old**
- His grandfather **Abdul Muttalib** then took care of him, but he too passed away when Muhammad ﷺ was **8 years old**
- His uncle **Abu Talib** became his guardian and remained deeply loyal to him throughout his life

Chapter 3 — Youth, Character, and Early Adulthood

As a young man, Prophet Muhammad ﷺ stood out in a corrupt society for his **exceptional moral character**. He was known by the people of Makkah as:

- **Al-Amin** — the Trustworthy
- **Al-Sadiq** — the Truthful

He worked as a **shepherd** — a humble occupation shared by many prophets before him — and later became a **trader**. He traveled with his uncle Abu Talib on trade journeys, including a famous trip to **Syria**, where a Christian monk named **Bahira** recognized signs of prophethood in the young Muhammad ﷺ.

He participated in the **Hilf al-Fudul (League of the Virtuous)**, a pact formed by noble Makkans to protect the rights of the weak and oppressed. Even after prophethood, he praised this alliance.

He never worshipped idols, never drank alcohol, and was known for his deep sense of justice, kindness, and wisdom.

Chapter 4 — Marriage to Khadijah (RA) (~595 CE)

The noble businesswoman **Khadijah bint Khuwaylid (RA)** heard about Muhammad's ﷺ honesty and trustworthiness and hired him to manage her trade caravan to Syria. He returned with great profits and impressed her deeply.

Khadijah (RA) proposed marriage to him through a trusted friend. He was **25 years old** and she was **40 years old** at the time of their marriage.

Their marriage was one of the most beautiful in history:

- She was his **greatest supporter, confidante, and companion**
- He **never married another woman** while she was alive
- Together they had **six children**: two sons (Qasim and Abdullah, both died in infancy) and four daughters (Zaynab, Ruqayyah, Umm Kulthum, and Fatimah)
- The most beloved of his daughters was **Fatimah (RA)**

Khadijah (RA) was the first person to believe in him when revelation came, and her love, wisdom, and support were a pillar of strength in the most difficult early years of Islam.

Chapter 5 — The First Revelation (610 CE)

As he approached the age of **40**, Prophet Muhammad ﷺ increasingly withdrew to the **cave of Hira** on a mountain near Makkah for meditation and contemplation. He was deeply troubled by the corruption and injustice around him.

One night — the **Night of Power (Laylat al-Qadr)** in the month of **Ramadan** — the angel **Jibreel (AS)** appeared and commanded:

"Iqra!" — "Read!"

The Prophet ﷺ responded that he could not read. Jibreel embraced him powerfully three times, and then revealed the first five verses of **Surah Al-Alaq**:

"Read in the name of your Lord who created — created man from a clinging substance. Read, and your Lord is the Most Generous — who taught by the pen — taught man that which he knew not."

The Prophet ﷺ returned home trembling and frightened. Khadijah (RA) comforted and wrapped him in a garment, and then took him to her cousin **Waraqah ibn Nawfal**, a learned Christian scholar, who confirmed that Muhammad ﷺ had received the same revelation as the Prophet Musa (AS).

This night changed the world forever. ✨

📌 Chapter 6 — Early Islam and First Believers (610–613 CE)

For the first **three years**, the call to Islam was **private and secret**. The first believers were:

- **Khadijah (RA)** — first woman and first adult to accept Islam
- **Abu Bakr al-Siddiq (RA)** — first free adult man
- **Ali ibn Abi Talib (RA)** — first child to accept Islam
- **Zayd ibn Harithah (RA)** — first freed slave to accept Islam
- **Bilal ibn Rabah (RA)** — later became the first caller to prayer (muezzin)

Through Abu Bakr (RA), several other noble companions accepted Islam, including **Uthman ibn Affan (RA)**, **Zubayr ibn al-Awwam (RA)**, **Abd al-Rahman ibn Awf (RA)**, and **Sa'd ibn Abi Waqqas (RA)**.

These early Muslims gathered secretly in the **house of Al-Arqam** to learn, pray, and support one another.

📌 Chapter 7 — Public Preaching and Quraysh Opposition (613–615 CE)

When Allah commanded **open preaching**, the Prophet ﷺ climbed Mount Safa and called all of Makkah, asking them: *"If I told you an enemy army was behind this mountain, would you believe me?"* They said yes. He then declared his prophethood.

His own uncle **Abu Lahab** immediately rejected and insulted him — a chapter of the Qur'an (**Surah Al-Masad**) was later revealed about him.

The Quraysh leaders feared that Islam would:

- Destroy their idol-based economy
- Challenge their social authority
- Unite the poor and the slaves against them

Their opposition was fierce and cruel:

- **Bilal (RA)** was dragged across hot desert sand with a rock on his chest
- **Sumayyah (RA)** became the **first martyr of Islam**, killed by Abu Jahl
- **Yasir (RA)**, her husband, was also martyred
- Many companions were tortured, imprisoned, and ostracized

The Prophet ﷺ himself endured mockery, garbage thrown on him, and physical abuse — yet he remained patient and forgiving.

📌 Chapter 8 — Migration to Abyssinia (~615 CE)

Unable to bear the persecution, the Prophet ﷺ instructed a group of Muslims to migrate to **Abyssinia (modern Ethiopia)**, where a just Christian king, **Negus (Ashama ibn Abjar)**, ruled.

When the Quraysh sent delegates to bring the Muslims back, the Negus heard both sides. **Jafar ibn Abi Talib (RA)** recited verses from **Surah Maryam** about Prophet Isa (Jesus, AS) and his mother. The Negus was moved to tears and refused to hand over the Muslims, saying:

"By God, Jesus is not more than what you have described."

This was a remarkable moment — the first diplomatic victory for the Muslim community.

📌 Chapter 9 — The Year of Sorrow (~619 CE)

This was one of the **darkest and most painful years** in the Prophet's ﷺ life.

First, the Quraysh imposed a **total social and economic boycott** on the Banu Hashim clan for **three years**, forcing them into a mountain valley (**Shi'b Abi Talib**) where they faced severe hunger and hardship.

When the boycott finally ended, two devastating losses followed:

- 💔 **Khadijah (RA)** passed away — his beloved wife of 25 years, his greatest supporter

- ❤️ **Abu Talib** passed away — his uncle and protector, who had shielded him from the worst of Qurayshi violence

Without his uncle's protection, the Prophet ﷺ became vulnerable. He traveled to **Taif** seeking a new base of support, but the people there mocked him, insulted him, and had their children throw stones at him until his feet bled.

Even then, when Angel Jibreel offered to crush the people of Taif between two mountains, the Prophet ﷺ refused and said:

"I hope that Allah will bring forth from their descendants people who will worship Allah alone."

This moment stands as one of the greatest examples of **mercy and forgiveness** in human history. 🌹

📌 Chapter 10 — Isra and Mi'raj (~619–620 CE)

As a **gift and comfort** to His beloved prophet during this time of sorrow, Allah took him on the miraculous journey of **Isra and Mi'raj**:

- **Isra**: The night journey from **Masjid al-Haram** in Makkah to **Masjid al-Aqsa** in Jerusalem, riding the **Buraq** — a celestial creature

After years of persecution and with a plot by Quraysh leaders to **assassinate** the Prophet ﷺ, Allah gave permission to migrate to **Yathrib** (later renamed **Madinah al-Munawwarah** — the City of Light).

Key events of the Hijrah:

- **Ali (RA)** slept in the Prophet's ﷺ bed as a decoy, risking his life
- The Prophet ﷺ and **Abu Bakr (RA)** hid in the **Cave of Thawr** for three days
- Quraysh search parties came to the cave entrance, but a spider web and bird's nest miraculously concealed the entrance
- Abu Bakr (RA) whispered in fear — the Prophet ﷺ comforted him: *"Do not grieve — indeed Allah is with us."*
- After three days, they continued the journey to Madinah

The people of Madinah — the **Ansar (Helpers)** — welcomed them with immense joy, singing:

"Tala'a al-Badru alayna..." — "The full moon has risen upon us..."

This **Hijrah in 622 CE** marks the beginning of the **Islamic (Hijri) Calendar**.

📌 Chapter 12 — Building the Muslim Community in Madinah (622–624 CE)

In Madinah, the Prophet ﷺ became not only a spiritual leader but also a wise **statesman, judge, and community builder**. He established several key foundations:

- 🕌 **Masjid al-Nabawi** — the Prophet's Mosque, built as the center of community life, prayer, learning, and governance

⚔️ Battle of Badr (624 CE)

The first major battle. 313 ill-equipped Muslims faced over 1,000 Qurayshi warriors. Through divine support and brilliant strategy, the Muslims won a **decisive victory**. This battle proved that faith could overcome material superiority.

🗡️ Battle of Uhud (625 CE)

📌 Chapter 14 — The Treaty of Hdaybiyyah (628 CE)

The Prophet ﷺ set out for Makkah with 1,400 companions to perform Umrah. The Quraysh blocked them at **Hdaybiyyah**. After negotiations, a **10-year peace treaty** was signed with seemingly unfavorable terms for Muslims.

Many companions were upset, but the Prophet ﷺ accepted it with wisdom. Allah declared it a **clear victory** in Surah Al-Fath. The treaty allowed:

- **Peaceful coexistence** and trade
- **Freedom to spread Islam** without military conflict
- Rapid growth in the number of Muslims
- Strategic positioning for the future

📌 Chapter 15 — Conquest of Makkah (630 CE)

When the Quraysh violated the treaty, the Prophet ﷺ marched on Makkah with an army of **10,000 Muslims**. The city surrendered almost without a fight.

📌 Chapter 16 — The Farewell Pilgrimage and Sermon (632 CE)

In the **10th year of Hijrah**, the Prophet ﷺ performed his one and only **Hajj** — known as the **Farewell Pilgrimage (Hajjat al-Wida)**. Over **100,000 companions** accompanied him.

At the end of the sermon, the verse was revealed:

"This day I have perfected for you your religion and completed My favor upon you and have approved for you Islam as religion." — Surah Al-Ma'idah 5:3

Chapter 17 — The Passing of the Prophet ﷺ (632 CE)

Shortly after his return from the Farewell Pilgrimage, the Prophet ﷺ fell ill with a **severe fever and headache**. During his illness, he continued to lead prayers for as long as he could. When he became too weak, he appointed **Abu Bakr (RA)** to lead the prayers.

On **Monday, 12 Rabi al-Awwal, 11 AH (June 8, 632 CE)**, the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ passed away in the room of his wife **Aisha (RA)** in Madinah. His last words were:

"O Allah, with the highest companions... O Allah, with the highest companions... O Allah, with the highest companions."

The news of his death shook the Muslim world. **Umar (RA)** could not accept it and threatened anyone who said so. But **Abu Bakr (RA)** stood and addressed the people with words that will echo forever:

"Whoever worshipped Muhammad, let him know that Muhammad has died. But whoever worshipped Allah — then indeed Allah is ever-Living and will never die."

He was **buried in the room of Aisha (RA)**, which is now within the **Prophet's Mosque in Madinah** — visited by millions of Muslims every year with love and reverence. 🕌
